As part of a whole school approach, PSHCE at Sandbach School develops the qualities and attributes students need to thrive as individuals as well as members of society. In addition, Sandbach School strives to develop the values that underpin British society and life.

Delivery of PSHCE/British Values

- PSHCE is delivered during Wednesday Pastoral sessions of 25 mins and 45 mins by form tutors.
- Form tutors use resources prepared in advance that are discussed at the tutor team meeting prior to the unit of work being delivered.
- External training is provided to tutors when a unit requires e.g Sex Education Year 9; Careers Year 11.

PSHCE is also delivered via 3 Student Enrichment Days.
