Year 8 History Curriculum Sequence

<u>Intent</u>: Our Year 8 Curriculum will take pupils on a journey from pre-Columbian America to Europe during the Holocaust looking through the lens of power, shifting power and power imbalance. Taking into account the differing nature of power, pupils will consider how different peoples have exerted power over others and the impact on all involved.

Why the Spain Project? The Spain cross-curricular scheme is a school initiative to support student consolidation from year 7 into 8, settling students back into an atmosphere of learning and academic rigour thereby creating a sense of academic familiarity which encourages students to engage with History at KS3. Why Aztecs and Incas here? This connects the history curriculum to the Spain Project really well. It also forms a clear starting point of non-European civilisations before colonisation and imperialism challenge assumptions that they are backwards, uncivil and in need of the Western World and culture	Why this module? This module allows students to engage with the development of British Empire and explore relevant issues like Imperialism and Colonialism. This unit will put the British Empire in context of other World events and issues and crucially consider the impact of Empire by looking closely at the people most effected, the colonised.	Why this module? This module allows students to analyse the significant changes that happened during the Industrial period which had a significant long term impact on Britain. By looking at the light and dark of the Industrial Period pupils consider the implications for the ideas of Adam Smith and the observations of Engels in Manchester whilst later going on to consider one the lasting legacies from the Industrial period – organised football in England	Why These modules? After briefly looking at the causes, pupils will consider the idea of living and dying on the Western Front focuses on the lived experiences of the troops in WWI behind the lines but also in the trenches and looks at the tactics, conditions and weapons of this 'new' form of warfare. This unit will be very source heavy due to the range and extent of available material. This fits perfectly after studying the British Empire and Industrial Period which gave Britain it status in the World	Why These modules? Why teach 1920's America? The interwar years in America is vital to understand 20 th century history not only through core concepts like trade, industry and industrialisation but also racism, consumerism and gangsterism in addition to the growing clash between capitalism and communism	Why this module? This module will establish the horror of modern warfare through the experiences of the soldiers but also from the point of view of the home front. This unit will also focus on the mobilisation of society for the war effort and the wider impacts. This will also touch on the consequences of Total War for the world after 1945
